programs on the cutting edge. She has a knack for identifying the strengths of those on her faculty and then encouraging each teacher to use that talent for the benefit of the learners.

In October, she was recognized by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia with the "Distinguished Principal" award. She was only one of a few principals in the Archdiocese to be recognized.

Results of this kind of empowerment are the school sponsored Global Warming Conference, the Shakespeare Club and participation in The Stock Market Game. A high priority is placed on engaging students in the learning process. Within classrooms students feel free to take educational risks knowing that they will be supported by their teachers.

Lessons observed were anchored in relevant, real-life experiences that allowed for increased rigor. Students show great familiarity with using graphic organizers, working in groups, comparing and contrasting, just to name a few of the strategies of Robert Marzano that are in play.

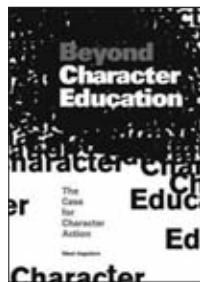
This principal has plans for the healthy future for her school, learning tactics from CHILD to promote sustainability. Over all this is the mantle of Catholic Identity. Signs and symbols of the faith are visible throughout the school. Relationships are Christ centered and at the heart of these is Louise Sheehan, motivating all to respect and care for one another.

## Character In Action

What is character? Webster defines character as "a distinctive trait, quality or attribute ... moral strength, self-discipline." We at St. Dorothy School provide a rich, challenging academic

environment for our students. In addition we expect and encourage our students to develop character traits which reflect upon their Catholic heritage.

In the past, we have used lecture-based character education programs. Those programs, however, failed to provide a process in which students could reflect on and



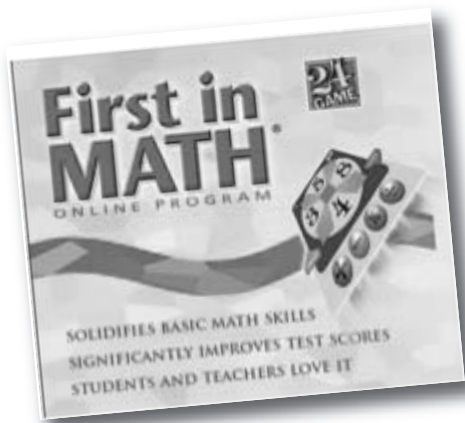
apply good character traits to their daily lives.

After reading Mawi Asgedom's book *Beyond Character Education*, we implemented his idea of challenging students to

reflect on the ways in which they apply their character traits in their daily interactions. Every First Friday, prior to attending Mass, the students journal on how they have lived as people of character during the past month. Following their journaling, they meet in groups with their peers and discuss their application of character.

This program has reaped benefits. We find students going out of their way to provide service to teachers, parents and students. This response leads us to proudly state, "St. Dorothy School Students are People of Character!"





## Online Math Program

St. Dorothy students in grades 5-8 are currently participating in “First in Math,” an online math program that is designed to improve students’ math skills.

Students are required to spend 15 minutes a night work-

ing on “First in Math” and their progress is charted on a weekly basis. The top ten students and teams in the school are recognized each week.

This program has generated much enthusiasm and excitement for all involved.

## Book Challenge

All students in grades K-8 have been challenged to read 40 books during the 2009-2010 school year! Think that’s too many??? Our students are demonstrating otherwise. Many of our students in grades K-4 and several of those in grades 7 and 8 had already read 40 books at the ½ way point of the school year!

After reading *The Book Whisperer* by Donnalyn Miller, the principal and faculty members decided to require students to read 40 books of various genres as a way to help them find pleasure in reading, expand their vocabulary and improve their reading comprehension. The teachers began by introducing and reviewing different genres; assigning a specific number for completion.

The students are required to record and report on their books. Some students write summaries and others blog

via in-class blog sites. Below are quotes about this 40 book requirement from some of our students:

# The Year of the Priest

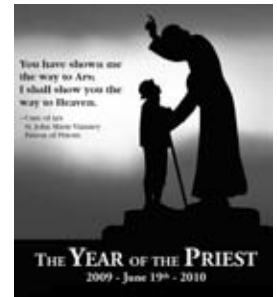

# Enrollment Up 5%

With continued efforts towards tuition stability, consistent marketing of the school and enhancements to the curriculum including Latin, Spanish and Smart Classrooms, we are pleased to report that enrollment has increased by 17 students this year. This net increase is equal to that in 2008 when a local grade school was forced to close its doors. This organic growth is a direct result of our school's value and Catholic identity in our area. A highly skilled administrative and teaching staff, a strong curriculum,

positive word of mouth and the value of a St. Dorothy's education have all contributed. With larger class sizes in K-4 and the graduation of smaller classes in grades 5-8, our future projections are for consistent growth. The addition of students at the 6th grade level has improved upper grade numbers, adding six(6) new students to this class, from 33 in 5th grade in '08 to 39 in 2009. The growth of our enrollment was an early goal of the Development Committee and we are pleased with the success in this area.

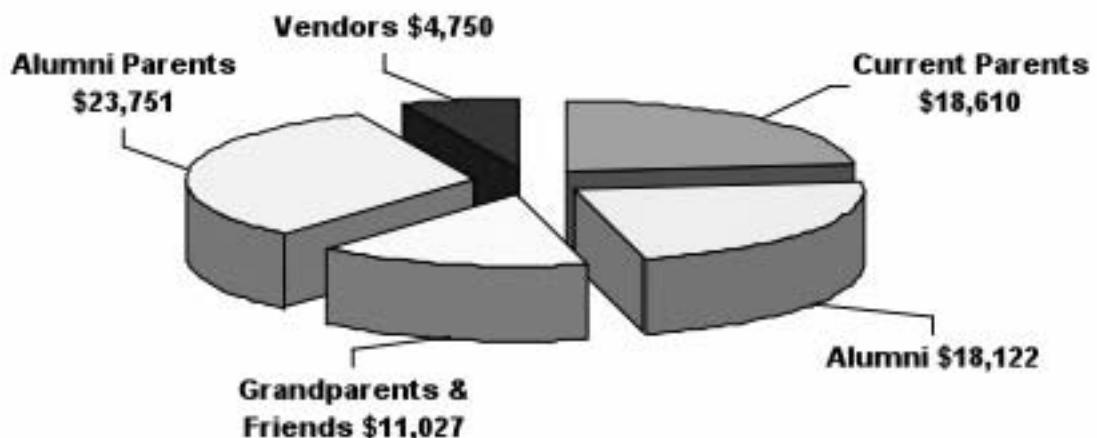

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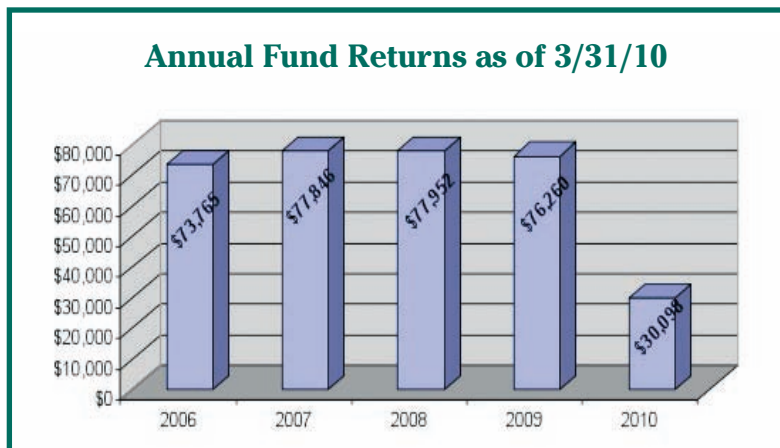
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# Please Support St. Dorothy School Annual Fund
